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“What is God's Will?”

What does God want me to do with my life? Where does God want me to go to college? Does God want me to get married or remain single? Does God want me to give a special gift for gospel ministry to my local church, to my area Lutheran high school or to the synod for world-wide mission work? What is God's will?

The truth is, we know nothing with certainty about God's will apart from what he has revealed in his Holy Word. God hasn't told us everything. He keeps some things hidden from us. Our gracious God allows us the freedom to make choices. Of course, there was one choice we couldn't make on our own. We couldn't choose to come into the family of God. We couldn't choose to come to faith. Thanks be to God, he chose us to be his own, even when we were dead in our sins. Jesus once told his disciples, “You did not choose me, but I chose you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last.” God created life-giving faith in our stone dead hearts using the gospel in Word and Sacrament. We have peace with God through faith in Jesus. We now live to praise our God and bring glory to his name. We want to do his will!

But how can we do his will if he keeps some of it hidden from us? How can we know what profession to pursue if God doesn't tell me? How can I know if marriage is right for me if God doesn't speak? How do I know how God wants me to use my money to bring him glory? The answer to these questions does not lie in trying to discern the hidden will of God. God doesn't expect us to guess what his will is. He gives us the ability to make choices. However, God does guide us as we make choices. He lays down principles for decision making in his holy Word. We know, for example, that God does not want us to pursue a life of crime. He tells us in his Word. We know that God does not want our life to be an endless pursuit of earthly pleasures. He tells us in his Word. We know that God wants us to gather for public worship with our fellow Christians. He tells us in his Word. We know that God wants us to use our possessions to take care of our families, to spread the gospel, to help the poor and to pay taxes. He tells us in his Word. Those things are all part of his revealed will.

His Word guides our choices as we are motivated by the gospel to serve him. We would never want to make a choice clearly contrary to God's revealed will. That would be sin.

Where God does not speak, we have the freedom to make choices. We pray to ask God to guide us as we make our decisions. We pray that God will bless the decisions that we make so they result in glory from him, and the good of our neighbor.

When we come to a fork in the road and have to decide which way to go, the decision is clear if one road is marked “good” and the other “evil.” But what if both roads are marked “good”? What do we do then? We make a decision and cling to the Lord's promise that he will be with us! Our gracious God takes our decisions into account as he fulfills his promise to make all things work together for our good (Romans 8:28).

Some members of David's Star may be wondering if it is God's will that we build a new church, or add space to our school, or do both? God hasn't revealed that answer in his Word. Here's what he has told us. He wants his people to gather for worship. He wants his people, young and old, to grow in faith. God wants us to stay close to Jesus in life, so we can live with him forever in heaven. God also wants us to “make disciples of all nations” by baptizing and teaching. God wants the gospel of Jesus proclaimed to all creation!

God gives us the freedom of choice when it comes to how we carry out the commission he has given us. The decisions we make as a group of believers need to be based on questions like these: How can we best carry out the Great Commission? Do the plans to build bring glory to God and help us carry out the work he has given us to do? We may come to different conclusions. That's O.K. We can have different opinions in matters not decided by a clear Word of God. God forbid that there is ever disagreement among us about the mission of our congregation and the work God calls us to do. Pray that God's will be done! Pray for the spread of the gospel. Pray that more and more people come to know Jesus as we live and work for him. Pray that God is glorified as we exercise our Christian freedom in all the good choices he allows us to make everyday.

DON'T KNOW WHERE TO START?

Henry Kissinger was quoted as saying; “**There cannot be a crisis next week.** My schedule is already full.” With the start of school and all of the fall activities has your list of things that need to be done become unmanageable? One way to reduce the stress and anxiety produced by an overcrowded schedule is to complete things systematically before you start new projects. Review your calendar for the week, the day, or even the hour and pick one item that can be completed in five minutes or less. Once you’ve finished it, cross it off the list and enjoy the accomplishment! One success sets you up for another.

Taking time out to be in God’s Word is another way to reduce your stress level! Psalm 34:8 says, “Taste and see that the Lord is good; blessed is the man who takes refuge in him.”

WELS UPDATE FROM THE STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

WELS congregations throughout metropolitan Houston are cleaning up after Hurricane Ike roared through the area September 13. While contact has not been made with every pastor in the region, there are no reports that any church buildings or parsonages suffered significant structural damage. Some have reported minor to moderate flooding.

WELS Committee on Relief granted King of Kings, Alexandria, Louisiana, and its pastor, Rev. Chris Esmay, \$60,000 to help the congregation recover after flood damage due to heavy rains following Hurricane Gustav. Four of five feet of water filled the church, fellowship hall, and parsonage September 3. The 90-member congregation did not have flood insurance. The money that WELS Relief offered will pay for gutting and cleaning the church and parsonage. It also will help provide for material needs, including temporary housing for Esmay and his family, and help support the congregation as it plans for its future.

As a result of the increasing drug-related violence in Juarez, Mexico, the Confessional Evangelical Lutheran Church – WELS’ sister synod in Mexico – has decided to pull its national pastor and his family out of the city. That move comes after the pastor and his family received death threats. His last Sunday at his church, Cristo Redentor (Christ Redeemer) was August 31.

After 41 years of service in Japan – their entire ministry – Missionary Kermit Habben and his wife, Margie, returned to the United States August 25. They plan to retire to Phoenix, Arizona. At this time, World Missions is not going to replace Habben. Growth over the 51-year history of the Japanese mission field has been slow, and resources are going to other places in the world where it seems the Lord is opening doors.

HUMBLE STEWARDS

As stewards, we are the recipients and caretakers of God's goodness, love, mercy, and grace. Stewards are managers of God's creation. We acknowledge God as the owner; therefore, we are to act not as owners but as managers because our lives and resources are simply on loan from Him.

The book of Daniel gives an account of a man who failed to recognize God as Creator and provider and exalted himself. King Nebuchadnezzar, walking on the roof of "his" royal palace, surveying "his" kingdom, was overcome by pride as he announced, *"Is not this the great Babylon I have built as the royal residence, by my mighty power and for the glory of my majesty"* (Daniel 4:30)? He thought he was asking a rhetorical question, but God condemned him to live like an animal as a consequence of his pride.

Pride is destructive. It destroys gratitude to God for all His kindness to us. It destroys our desire and ability to serve others. It destroys contentment for it feeds our competitive nature so that we are not satisfied with just being wealthy or intelligent, but we want to be wealthier and more intelligent than anyone else.

Pride has no place in the life of a servant. First Peter 5:6 reads, "Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand that He may lift you up in due time." It is God alone Who can exalt us (Psalm 75:7). If Christ Himself, God's only begotten Son, humbled Himself, should we not follow His example and humble ourselves? Because Christ humbled Himself, God exalted Him (Philippians 2:9)

David, the shepherd-king, put our situation in proper perspective: *"When I consider Your heavens, the work of Your fingers, the moon and the stars, which You have set in place, what is man that You are mindful of him, the son of man that You care for him"* (Psalm 8:3-4)? The inference is that we are insignificant, yet David goes on to remind us of what we can be proud: *"You made [us] ruler over the works of Your hands; You put everything under [our] feet."*

Humility allows us to accept our smallness and God's goodness. In the words of Martin Luther, humility is the decision to "let God be God". We are stewards through humility. We are to honor Him with what we have, what we are, and what He will make of us.

Special Voters Meeting

September 18, 2008

David's Star Ev. Lutheran Church,

Jackson, WI

The meeting was opened with devotion by Pastor Loescher.

The meeting was called to order by congregational meeting chairman Rod Kison.

The only item for action was the discussion of the internet antenna that was installed three years ago in our church steeple. A presentation was given by Randy Matter.

The existing antenna was located in our steeple with Nconnect being the internet provider. The lease with Nconnect/Bertram Wireless began in 12/05. The lease provides free internet for our church, school, and parsonages. We receive a cash payment of \$720 per year for having the antenna on our steeple. The total value of benefits received under this lease would approximate \$3000 per year. The lease has a 90 day termination notice.

The problem with the internet service began when we began installing the metal-backed shingles on our church steeple. The metal interfered with the ability for the antenna to provide proper reception for the customers of the internet provider. The shingling of the steeple was only half done when the problem occurred.

Our options regarding the steeple roof would include:

Finishing the job that was started and is half done. The steel-backed shingles are 50 year shingles. We have already paid \$6000 on this project. The balance due is \$6500.

Start over using cedar shakes. This would entail tearing off all shingles, steel and existing shakes. The cost would be \$14,600 (plus the \$6,000 already paid).

Start over using asphalt shingles. This would entail removing all shingles, steel and existing shakes. The cost would be \$8,600 (plus the \$6,000 already paid). This option is not advised due to copper sulfate content.

Relocate the antenna to a freestanding tower on our premises.

If we would place a freestanding tower on our campus, David's Star would own the tower and Bertram would have permanent easement to the tower. Bertram would pay a portion of the tower materials. Our current contract would be amended to not include our \$720 payment per year. The school and parsonages would continue with free internet.

Installation costs would be up for discussion with Bertram. Our options regarding towers would be a self supporting tower or a monopole tower.

A self supporting tower could be either 100' or 150'. The 100' tower would have a total cost of \$33,100 with David's Star paying \$9,400, Bertram paying \$14,000, and installation costs being \$9,700. The 150' tower would have a total cost of \$53,800 with David's Star paying \$13,300, Bertram paying \$26,000, and installation costs being \$14,500. The Town of Jackson has indicated that this type of tower is not preferred.

The monopole tower could be either 100' or 180'. The 100' tower would have a total cost of \$49,567 with David's Star paying \$21,067, Bertram paying \$20,000, and installation cost being \$8,500. The 180' tower would have a total cost of \$84,038 with David's Star paying \$30,538, Bertram paying \$38,000, and installation costs being \$15,500.

Tower implications would include the cost to congregation, as well as the potential revenue source for the congregation, which might include Bertram internet savings, other antennas, and a land lease. We do not know the revenue potential, so we don't know the payback. There is also sight line and ascetic considerations. A town conditional use permit is required with a \$300 fee.

Other antenna options would include putting the antenna back inside of the steeple, but there would be roof shingle implications and Bertram might not accept. The other option might be to locate the antenna on top of the steeple, but there would be implications regarding ascetics and future construction obstructing line of sight.

As DSL and cable are not available and dial-up is no longer viable for our school, our other internet options would be limited to becoming a customer of Bertram and purchase service at \$2,300 per year, using ISDN which would probably work for the school only and be more costly, satellite at \$120 per month which could be used for the parsonages only, or a T1 line-only real option with a cost of \$400-\$650 per month plus installation.

Church council feels that we need to focus on what is in our ministry's best interests in every one of our decisions. Thus, we recommend:

- That we finish the church steeple roof with steel shingles and mount the internet antenna back on the outside of the steeple, pending further research.
- Deciding that whatever the course of action for the internet antenna, that we will continue providing the best possible internet service to our campus and parsonages.

- Forming a subcommittee to research the proposed options for locating the antenna that are consistent with David's Star's mission and ministry.

The above recommendation was made into a motion and seconded. The motion was carried.

The meeting was adjourned.

The Meeting closed with prayer by Pastor Loescher.
